Message from Pastor Tim

My dear family of Cross Lutheran.

As I wandered through the weekend's activities and watched the grand parade, I couldn't help but notice all of the different sponsors who helped make the Festival happen. It made me stop and ponder. It truly amazes me that sponsors willingly commit to pay for an event so that others, who cannot afford to pay, are able to enjoy games, parades, music, etc. Obviously their goal is for name recognition and hoping for future business.

This leads me to a question; have you ever had anybody help (sponsor) you in your life time and wanting nothing in return? I'm sure all of us can answer yes to that in one form or another. Personally, I can answer ves to that more than I care to admit. I feel very uncomfortable to receive something of value without something on my part to give back. For me to say thank you seems very shallow and does not even come close to the "monetary value" that was given. Yet I say thank you and thank God for providing. Synod Assembly Report

Synod Assembly Report A joint synod Assembly of the North/West Lower Michigan Synod and Southeast Michigan Synod was held May 20-22, 2010 at the Lansing Center, Lansing, Michigan. The theme "For the Lord Loves Justice" was taken from Psalm 37:28 "For the Lord loves justice; He will not forsake His faithful ones." These powerful words reveal God's compassion for all who experience injustice and delight in those who dedicate their

lives to lifting up the lonely, the lowly and the left- out.

The assembly began on Thursday at noon with a picnic lunch on the Capitol Lawn, giving folks an opportunity to discuss social justice issues with state senators and representatives. Thursday evening Opening Worship and Eucharist were presided over by Bishop Stephen Marsch. An impressive offering of over \$25,000 was received that evening for the ELCA World Hunger Appeal.

Friday began with Morning Prayer and a welcome from Bishop Schleicher. A Churchwide Greeting and Report were given by Carlos Pena, Vice President of the ELCA. He stated that Christ has no body on earth but ours, and he thanked us for our gifts of time and talents to the church. We watched Bishop Hanson's greetings on a video entitled "Everyday Evangelists." In 2009 the people of the ELCA said "Here I am

Lord, send me" and shared 220,000 quilts with the world, sent aid to 80,000 people in Haiti after the earthquake and started up 32 new congregations.

The next day and a half were long and busy days of worship, speakers, work-shops, plenary sessions, committee reports, resolutions and voting. Resolution A (Ministry to Those Affected by Crime), Resolution B (Energy Stewardship), Resolution C (A Call to Citizenship) and Resolution D (Michigan's 2010-2011 Budget- as amended) were all adopted. Resolution E (Establishing a Non-Geographic Conference) was defeated. Resolution F (Justice and Water) and Resolution G (Living Water Ministries) were adopted. If you are interersted in more information about the con-tent and wording of these resolutions, we would be glad to share that inform-ation with you. During the Election of the 2011 Churchwide Assembly Voting Members, we had the opportunity to vote for our own Tom Shupe. We are sad that he was not elected, but happy to report that he received 116 votes.

It was fun running into old and new friends at the as-sembly. We were especially happy to see and get hugs from Pastor Tom Zollman and Pastor Orth. We also had a chance to visit with Pastor Dawn Pooley.

A number of workshops were offered on Friday, and we attended Adoption: One Church One Child One Fam-ily presented by Vickie Thompson-Sandy, Lutheran Social Services of Michigan's Vice President of Services for Children and Families. Did

you know that on any given day, LSSM has over 800 children in foster care, of which, many of them (up to 400 children per day) are working toward an adop-tion by their care giver? Over 60 children are ready for adoption, but have no family who has committed to adopting them. Many of these are children over the age of 8, but half of them are under the age of 10 and need to be adopted with their brother or sister. We also attended A New Be-ginning for the World's Homeless, presented by Belmin Pinjic and Mihaela Mitrofan. This workshop explained the barriers, challenges and achieve-ments of the LSSM Refugee Employment and Resettle-ment programs and what we can to do help. Refugees from Iraq are the highest number of people being processed. There are 2 million refugees outside Iraq and 2 million displaced inside Iraq. In metropolitan Detroit they are only reset-tling those people who have U.S. ties (relatives). The free cases (those with no U.S. ties) are going to Grand Rapids and Battle Creek. Arrangements must be made for getting them apartments; filling the refrig-erator with food; picking them up at the airport; help-ing them apply for driver's licenses, assistance, filling out job applications, etc.

The keynote speaker on
Friday afternoon was Bishop
Margaret Payne of the New
England Synod. She chal-lenged
us to 5 steps to doing justice: 1)
Look up the river (see where the
problem is coming from), 2) Cross
a boundary (get to know peo-ple
different from us), 3) Choose the
right kind of guilt, 4) Think upside

down and 5) Do one thing.

On Saturday morning at the closing worship, Bishop Schleicher told us that deep in each of us is a river of liv-ing water (Spirit) gushing, ready to come out of us. It refreshes, renews, em-boldens us, provides us with words to speak for those whose lives have been diminished. Drenched with the grace of God, we all have that living water. We are diverse, yet we are the same (the elderly, the pri-soner, the child, the dis-abled, the refugee.) God has already decided to lift up the lowly--we are on board to do His will. Lord, direct us today.

We thank you for keeping us in your prayers as we traveled and represented Cross Lutheran Church and School at this assembly.

### A Glimpse from Aaron Shupe

Crammed in the back of a taxi heading for Dakar, Senegal, I found myself unexpectedly traveling and conversing with a European 'backpacker/tourist.' As palm trees and salt flats zipped past we spoke briefly of our backgrounds. He, being in his mid 40's, shared bits of growing up behind the Iron Curtain in Eastern Germany and of recent adventure-seeking pleasure travels throughout the world including North Korea, Iran, and Sudan. After briefly sharing that I had lived in West Africa the last few years, he seemed actually in a bit of a daze and even confused. 'Why? What's in it for you?' he asked, struggling within his worldview, thinking maybe it was really fun for me or at least might look good on a resumé. I don't actually remember my answer at the time but as I've reflected on his questions since, Psalm 130 continually comes to me.

Out of the depths I cry to you, O LORD! O Lord, hear my voice! Let your ears be attentive to the voice of my pleas for mercy! If you, O LORD, should mark iniquities, O Lord, who could stand? But with you there is forgiveness, that you may be feared. I wait for the LORD, my soul waits, and in his word I hope; my soul waits for the Lord more than watchmen for the morning, more than watchmen for the morning. O Israel, hope in the LORD! For with the LORD there is steadfast love, and with him is plentiful redemption. And he will redeem Israel from all his iniquities. Psalm 130 ESV

I've already 'got what's in it for me,' more than I could ever want through the hope we have in the LORD. I too pray that this hope may be the Fulbe's.

And the work continues. There are still people who have not heard, places where a spiritual darkness has hold. Though I've now returned back to the States I am thankful for families and individuals who remain faithful to God's calling, for the Hoflands who I've been able to work with. I am thankful too that they've found a tutor to continue what I have been doing.

In my time in West Africa I have come to realize the struggle missionary parents often have in determining how their children will be educated. All too common this is a reason that families leave the field. I'm thankful to have been able to hop in this role and help the last three years. It has been amazing to see how much each of the kids has learned along the way.

Your support, prayer, and interest through this time have been encouraging, inspiring, priceless, and simply incredible. Thanks so much for being part of this

ministry and I pray that you will continue to find ways to share our hope in Christ with people who have not heard before.

As for plans for my future, for the next few months, I hope to be with my family in Michigan on the farm, where I am now, with intentions to pursue something in teaching and/or missions in the near future. Hopefully you will hear from me again before too long.:)
