Message from Pastor Tim

My dear family of Cross Lutheran Church,

The season of Epiphany is almost over and Ash Wednesday (Feb 22) and Lent are rapidly approaching. During this season of Epiphany we have been reading in the Gospels how Jesus has started his short ministry with his baptism, time in the wilderness, calling his disciples, and then going out and proclaiming the Good News.

In all that, there is a subliminal message for all of us which we always miss. The obvious message from Jesus is to follow him and teach others to follow him. However, the subliminal message in all of that is to "intentionally" follow Je-Christ and "intentionally" live the life style of Jesus Christ. We are to be intentional about all that we do by making God/Jesus Christ number one in our lives. We are to go out of our way as did Jesus Christ to proclaim the Good News.

The question then becomes do we intentionally live the life style

that Jesus Christ lived? Do we go out of our way proclaim Jesus Christ? I'm starting to get a bad feeling about that. Today we are very intentional in a million ways e.g. getting to work, getting to the grocery store, being active in clubs, organizations, etc., however; when it comes to being intentional about Jesus Christ, our urgency and energy wanes and fades. What if God were as intentional with us as we are with Him? What would we feel like when we really needed God in our crisis and God said 'not now, you're not a priority for me. I'm busy.' Thank God that He does not stoop down to our level of immaturity and always has us as a priority in His life with out fail. For without that we will surely die.

Jesus Christ is calling each and every one of us to follow him and to make our lives intentional in everyway to proclaim the Good News. What does that look like for each of us? We need to figure that out for our selves. We

need to do that by praying to God for strength and courage to be intentional to Him even when our life circumstances emphatically say no. Each of us needs to determine how we will change our life styles so it will honor God and not honor our materialistic world.

GUEST PRESENTATIONS/ REQUESTS: Carol Diener appeared and advised council that the ELCA is no longer providing health care for our staff. NALC will be providing through Hahn Group Insurance. This insurance will cost an additional \$2,098.00 year, but it has better coverage. She also indicated that a flex plan is offered, along with dental and vision. She also wondered if David Faupel should be added at this time, it would bring the cost of coverage to \$10,769.00 per year, but this is the only time he can be added during this open window; otherwise it would take a qualifying event to add him later. Discussion followed by all present, David is currently a three year teacher, making a salary of \$18,500.00 per year with no benefits. Council needs to make a decision tonight, otherwise we lose the open window. The open window would end January, 2012. Tom Shupe made the Motion to include David Faupel in the health insurance program offered by NALC and contracted with Hahn Group Insurance, supported by John Smith. Motion carried. Nancy Heck was opposed.
