From the Pastor's desk at Cross Lutheran Church-NALC,



Holy Week seems to ask us this same question each Church year. "What would you rather hear first, the good news or the bad news?" Palm Sunday arrives with the good news of Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem. With joy we hear the crowds shouting, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest!" (Matthew 21:9) The people welcome Jesus as the King who comes

in the name of the Lord, and for them this is good news, but the bad news will soon arrive. "And when he [Jesus] drew near and saw the city, he wept over it..." (Luke 19:41)

As we travel further into Holy Week, the celebration of Palm Sunday fades and we once again enter a time of uncertainty and darkness with the disciples. We sit with Jesus in the shadows of the upper room as He prepares the Last Supper. At night, we travel with Him to the Garden of Gethsemane and sleep while He prays to His Father in Heaven. Later, we see Jesus arrested and taken away to be mocked, spit on, and flogged. We grieve as Jesus is nailed to a cross to die a bitter death. We hear His final words, "Father, into your hands I commit my spirit! And having said this he breathed his last." (Luke 23:46) We feel the quiet darkness of the tomb. But we must not remain in complete sorrow, but remember Jesus' words. "Three days later he will rise." (Mark 10:34b)

Throughout Holy Week to Easter Sunday and every day beyond, we need to continually hear that God promises to be with us in all our joys and in all our sorrows. By Christ's death on the cross, He broke the bonds of sin, death, and the power of the devil opening the way to eternal life for you! In all of the good news and bad news, the <u>first news</u> you need to hear is that Jesus Christ is your risen Lord and Savior! Through His love for you, 'your sorrow will turn into joy.'

"Alleluia, He is risen! ~ He is risen indeed! ~ Alleluia!

May the Good News of Easter morning bring to you the sure and certain hope of the resurrection to eternal life. May the Good News of Easter morning transform your tears of pain and sadness into joy and gladness. And may the Good News of Easter morning continue to echo its proclamation in your heart throughout this Easter Season and beyond!

Weekly Devotional April 4, 2021 — Easter Day

(The Lord) will swallow up death forever; and the Lord GOD will wipe away tears from all faces and the reproach of his people he will take away from all the earth, for the LORD has spoken. - Isaiah 25:8

If you've ever had occasion to feel the sickness of shame and guilt, then you know what it means to truly need forgiveness. Forgiveness is something that all of humanity yearns for, even if we hear some say they don't need it or don't care about it. This does not seem plausible. We were created in God's image, to be in relationship with him and with one another, and therefore the quality of those relationships is inherently important to all of us. No one likes it when someone is angry with them - it leaves us uneasy and it's hard not to think about. The Good News of Easter is that Christ came to put an end to the separation we humans experience with God and with each other. Through sin we have all experienced death. Sometimes that death is the death of relationships, or even the death of some dream we have in mind. But death affects all of us. Into the life of the world came Jesus, the Savior, and through his life, death, and resurrection, God swallowed up death forever. Part of this has happened already and part of this eradication of death is yet to come. Through Jesus, God has taken away the reproach we deserve. We are sinners in need of grace, and yet through the waters of Holy Baptism we are made into new creations. This is all done through the power of Christ's love for us, a love that was nailed to the cross of Calvary, buried in a borrowed tomb, and was made alive again three days later. Christ's love frees us from the gloom of God's judgment and allows all our tears to be wiped away and replaced by pure joy, hope, and new life. It seems that the only way we can truly comprehend this grace is to understand the depths of our sinfulness. If we think, "I'm not so bad; at least I've never murdered anyone or cheated on my taxes or my wife," then we cannot understand the depths of our need for forgiveness. But when we are in touch with that need (like the publican in Luke 18:9-14), then as Christ offers us his grace we weep with tears of joy and not tears of guilt or sorrow. We recognize just what he has done for us, and it is incredible!






CROSS LUTHERAN CHURCH COUNCIL MINUTES

Property Committee Monthly

The property committee has been very busy this past month. Most of you have seen the progress in the connector hallway. The office wall has been moved to provide a larger room for the infants. Wiring has been modified to accommodate the new spaces as well as provide communication links to what will be Pastor Glenn's new office (former counting room). Final repairs and shelving are being completed around the monitor in the overflow. The fluorescent fixtures in the church and offices are being converted to LED lighting to provide a better quality of light at a lower cost on the utility bill. The sound booth continues to provide good service with a few kinks being worked out from time to time.

Other minor repairs have been accomplished including exterior flashing (wind damage), ceiling repair in classrooms and cracks in parsonage drywall.

Moving forward, we will continue with the connector remodel by installing carpeting and getting the secretary moved to her permanent location. Once that is done, the pastor's old office can be refurbished with paint and carpet and will become the new office for the financial secretary and school administrators. The infant room will be finished shortly with the exception of the egress window. Once the contractor installs that, the day care will be moved from the family room. When the dust settles in the connector, we will continue to get Pastor Glenn installed in the new office and consider new uses for the family room.

As always, we serve at the pleasure of the congregation and appreciate your patience during this time of rearrangement as well as your comments and suggestions.

Worship and Music

The committee would like to bring it to the congregation's attention that planning is underway to consider needed repairs and desired improvements to our pipe organ. The organ has served faithfully since the '60s and has had one maintenance period during all that time aside from regular tuning. Like all of us at a certain age, the organ has parts that need repair so that it can continue to serve us well into the future. The bellows leather is showing signs of wear and needs to be reinforced to prevent failure. The shades which actually control volume (and are not classy eyewear) have some non-functioning segments and should be upgraded to a digital motor control system. The console could also use improvements to give the organist better control over settings by using digital presets and other enhancements. These could include the use of MIDI which would provide an interface to other electronic devices such as keyboards and recording and playback options.

The committee is examining all possibilities and is gathering data from several vendors in order to eventually make a recommendation to council and the congregation. We are bringing this to your attention now to make it clear that the organ is not a 'dead' instrument and that any pledges that are made to the organ fund will be put to good and productive use.

Currently there is no active drive directed toward achieving these goals. However, it is our intention to have some definite recommendations within the year.

It is the committee's goal to care for the organ and refurbish it in a way that will support our traditional music and worship as well as embrace changes to bring modern music into our repertoire. It is our desire to create a comfortable space for all to praise our risen Lord.
