Message from Pastor Tim

Take a moment to think about the word WOR-SHIP. What comes to mind?

The definition of worship according to Westminster Dictionary of Theological Terms is

" The service of praise, adoration, thanksgiving, and petition directed toward God through actions and attitudes."

In the NRSV Bible the word praise appears 299 times. I think God is trying to tell us exactly how He is to be worshiped. NRS Psalm 147:1 Praise the LORD! How good it is to sing praises to our God; for he is gracious, and a song of praise is fitting.

Adoration is to "adore" God alone as the ultimate Lord. To do that is to live the authentic life in Jesus Christ.

Giving thanks to God is an expression of gratitude for all the blessings and goodness we have received but do not deserve because of our sinful nature

Petition is seeking and requesting what we think we need. However, the prayer always ends in not my will but yours.

Worship also includes tithing. Giving back to God what He has abundantly given us. This giving back, whether it is material, like money, or service to God, comes first and foremost in our lives.

With all of the above, worshiping God takes on many forms and faces. All of which are acceptable to God. However, we find ourselves frustrated, empty and lacking when me, myself, and I are at the center of our worship.

You know what I'm talking about: 'I didn't get anything out of the sermon, I feel empty when I leave church, I don't like the music, I had to sit in a different pew today, Why should I go to church when all I do is just get upset about this or that?' When did worshiping God center around us and how we feel? Where is God in that? For if we worship God in order to make us feel good we are worshiping our sinful self and expecting God to make us feel better. Who is the potter and who is the clav? Putting God first and praising Him is contrary to how our society tells us to live our lives of "what's in it for me?" True worship is something we bring to church, offer to God and share with one another.

NRS **Psalm 100:1** Make a

joyful noise to the LORD, all the earth. 2 Worship the LORD with gladness; come into his presence with singing. 3 Know that the LORD is God. It is he that made us, and we are his; we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture. 4 Enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise. Give thanks to him, bless his name. 5 For the LORD is good; his steadfast love endures forever, and his faithfulness to all generations.

It is precisely when we are feeling critical, deficient, alone or willful that we need to bend our knee and humble ourselves and as we focus our minds on who God is, what God has done and what He promises to do that we will be lifted spiritually. True worship strengthens our soul, encourages us to good works, allows love to grow and gives us proper perspective of our deep need for God's presents in every area of our lives. Worship is an internal work with outward expression not an outward experience done to please us. Intentionally worship God and you will find yourself surrounded in blessings you may have been missing.

Obituary

Gerald "Gerry" James Ernest Geppert, 74, of Port Austin, passed away Saturday, September 11, 2010 at Huron Medical Center in Bad Axe.

Born May 11, 1936 in Detroit, he was the son of the late Paul and Ethel (Ladenberger) Geppert, and was a 1954 graduate of Denby High School in Detroit. Following his 1959 graduation from Lawrence Tech, he served with the

U.S. Army from June 1959 until April 1961. He met Lois I. Hilyer while bowling, and the couple were united in marriage Nov. 27, 1965 in Detroit.

Gerry was a mechanical engineer, and was project manager as well as plant manager for Chrysler, at the Lynch Road Plant, the Warren Truck Plant, the Jeep Plant in Toledo, and the Jefferson Plant, where his daughter, Irene, worked with him until his Aug. 31, 1991 retirement.

Gerry enjoyed HO model trains, doing yard work, boating, water and snow skiing, canoeing, fishing, camping, and snowmobiling. He also enjoyed working in his garage on his cars, and woodworking. He actively took part in building their home at the lake.

He especially enjoyed spending time with his grandchildren and family; he enjoyed participating in activities with the family. He always was honest and straightforward in what he said and did. He currently was a member of the Lake Township Planning Board and Cross Lutheran Church in Pigeon. He lived life to the fullest.

Gerry's funeral service was conducted Sept. 15, 2010 here at Cross Lutheran Church and burial took place in the Caseville Township Cemetery.

Treasurers report, no expense with CEA, and internal school accounts were 5382.64. There are no invoices available. A motion to approved by Rice, and second by Roestel to accept. Approved

CEA Presidents report

Work continues on the Luau, tickets are available. August 15, 3-8pm and dinner from 5-6:30. The CEA board is minimal at this time so we are looking for new leaders.

Pastors report

School calendar handed out, will be mailed week of August 9.

Tuition program will be managed by Paul Schuette and hot lunch will be managed by Rachel Higgins.

We are anticipating 26 students at the beginning of the school year.

Old Business

Pastor has a lead on a laptop that may be a possibility for the school, we need to check with Brian Delpiere regarding his research thus far.

New Business

Hot Lunch discussion regarding families helping the in the kitchen. Karen has agreed that help in the kitchen could be reduced to 3 days a week-Monday, Wednesday, and Friday and that is acceptable. Motion by Roestel and second by Rice to reduce kitchen help 3 days a week rather than 5. Approved.

Rachel has gone through and updated the obvious, school hours were reviewed and updated.

Page 10: **Title change** Permanent expulsion policy needs to be changed to the dangerous weapons policy in order to be compliant with the accredidation.

Page 16: Chapel time changed to 8:10 am. Percentage disbursements for offering needs to be reworded as this is no longer the case.

Page 18: Preschool-Kindergarten computer capabilities should be addressed.

Page 24: **One call can be added** to paragraph regarding delays and closings.

Page 29: CEA fundraisers need to be updated.

Page 30: School supply list

should be listed as a **Spark Bible** rather than the Good
News Bible.

A medications policy needs to be added, Mrs. Musolff has typed up in order to be in compliance with accredidation.

Mission Statement and Philosophy needs to be added to be in compliance with the accredidation. Mission Statement: "Cross Lutheran School, guiding children to learn, to love, and to live under the grace of God's forgiveness". Philosophy is in the handbook.

School lunch fees paragraph needs to be addressed.

Delinquent tuition and hot lunch fees are still being pursued and it was noted that Delores Lange is owed \$108 for serving lunch for a family and a motion was made to pay Delores from the Library and Teaching fund by Roestel and second by Hemauer. Approved. It is noted that the full amount owed by this family is being pursued legally.

Advertising was discussed, Norma Hemauer volunteered to investigate advertising costs.



Guiding a path for others

PIGEON — Monday proved to be an extraordinary day for Cross Lutheran School, as parochial school educators from around the state spent the day there observing an ordinary school day. The Michigan Association of Non-Public Schools (MANS) hand picked Cross Lutheran

as a model school for multigrade level classrooms. Cross Lutheran, a K-8 school with 27 students, has three classrooms with three grades each. Throughout the course of the school day, close to 30 teachers, principals and superintendents from 14 parochial schools visited from areas such as Saginaw. Kalamazoo. Grand Rapids, Gaylord and Rogers City. In addition, Dr. Hakim Shahid of the teacher education program at Madonna University visited to glean ideas on how to better prepare teachers for multi-

ods to accomplish that," said Brian Broderick, MANS executive director.

Many of the schools visiting Cross Lutheran had two grades in one classroom, but not three, and they wanted to see how a three grade-level classroom worked. Some schools were experiencing declining enrollment and wanted to incorporate more multi-grade level classrooms into their schools.

"This also is a way to open more schools in rural areas," said Michael Knoff, Bay Area Catholic Schools administrator.

David Faber, superintendent of Catholic Schools for the Diocese of Grand Rapids, agreed.

"You don't have to have 150 kids to open a new school (when a school has multigrade level classrooms)," he said.

Educators said they were impressed with what they saw at Cross Lutheran, Several said they thought the teachers transitioned from one subject to another very smoothly. They also were impressed that Pas-

tor Tim Loehrke greeted each student by name in the morning and that he taught religion in the 6-8th-grade classroom for an hour.

"In the sixth through eighthgrade classroom, the teacher was teaching algebra to one group of students, and the other students were in a selfdirected reading group," said Cathy Gillmet of St. Ignatius School in Rogers City. "It was amazing. There is a lot of peer support — students helping each other. This leads to leadership skills for students." Other teachers echoed Gillmet's comments, noting students exhibited strong independent learning skills. Charles Taylor of the Diocese of Gaylord said he liked the peer interaction between the older and younger students. "It creates a family atmosphere," Taylor said. "The students seem comfortable and happy," Faber noted. Shahid said he liked how the teachers connected the les-

sons with everyday life, bringing the curriculum alive for the students. (Cont. on Pg. 11)

"They're making sure they apply what they're teaching to real situations," he said.

While the three Cross Lutheran teachers — Deb Musolff, Gwynne Barry and David Faupel — were flattered by the attention from their peers, they don't consider what they do in their classrooms as anything out of the ordinary. It's just what they do.

According to Barry, who teaches 3-5th-grade, the day of special attention originated when Barbara Stork, MANS assistant director, visited the school more than a year ago to help the school with the accreditation process through the Michigan Non-Public School Accrediting Association. Then in August, Barry called Stork with a question.

"She said, 'I was just thinking of your school," Barry said.

Barry said Stork told her she wanted parochial schools from across the state to visit Cross Lutheran for a day to see how the school operates its multi-grade level classes. She said some of the MANS member schools were calling the MANS Lansing office with questions about how to do multi-grade level classrooms because they were experiencing declining enrollment and revenue. Stork remembered what she had seen at Cross Lutheran during her recent visit and was impressed by the well-organized curriculum and the experienced teachers.
